They have led a variety of programmes including boys clubs, girls groups, sports coaching, leadership programmes, mentoring, lunchtime support, helping with trips, camps and a general part of school life.



Amber does mentoring with Zoe once a week on a Tuesday through the Big Brother Big Sister Programme. Amber and Zoe have had this mentoring relationship for a over 3 year, and they both have external supervision through BBBS staff members.

Amber has loved seeing Zoe grow up and really appreciates the one-on-one time they get. It did take a while for Zoe to trust Amber, however now Zoe speaks very freely and confidently because she knows Amber is a safe person to talk to. She is extremely proud of Zoe and to have her as a "little sister".









CLASSROOM SUPPORT

The youthworkers have spent a good amount of time in class, understanding how the open plan learning classrooms work, and supporting individuals on a variety of tasks. This includes anything from reading with a young person, helping them with their Maths, running a PE activity or an taking a small group for a ABL (Activity Based Learning) activity. The relationships built with teachers and students is leading to areas where we've seen a need and been able to offer specialist support to individuals, both academically and socially. We will build on these opportunities in Term 2.

YEAR 7/8 SLEEP OVER

This was an excellent chance for both Matt and Amber to continue building on the relationships they had built in class. It was a great way for us to see different sides of some personalities with the environment being one filled with excitement but also being a relaxed atmosphere at the same time.

BREAKTIME SUPPORT

Breaks are a great opportunity for us as youth workers as it gives us a great chance to connect with all of the young people in the school. We work with several young people in the various groups that we run however it's a different feel the relationship that you are able to build during free time compared to small groups, as well as helping out the duty teacher and running the odd game - it's a win-win situation.

YEAR 5/6 CAMP

Matt went with the Year 5 & 6's to the Waipara Boys Brigade Camp as youthwork support. Being able to come on camps and trips is a part of the job that we always look forward to and this camp was no exception. It proved a great opportunity to get to know names, connect with parents and staff better and have heaps of fun!

Helping run games, such as the night time Animal Survival, a rope swing team challenge was a good way to get connected in, as well as the mundane kitchen duties!


