#### **Post EQ Childrens Programmes**

A MASSIVE thank you to the many volunteers, organisations and entertainers who worked alongside us as we delivered childrens programmes after the February Earthquake. The need came from the immediate closure of all local schools, and the unknown date of their reopening. As a local trusted agency that provides children and youth activities, we were approached by local parent asking if we were going to offer anything while the schools were closed. With discussions with Central New Brighton School and some key leaders and staff, we put together a fun childrens programme, on school grounds from Monday 28<sup>th</sup> Feb. Our daily programme ran for 11 days, and over 1500 children signed in! All this was done with a youthwork staff team of 4 paid staff, 12 key volunteers and over 70 volunteers, who gave of their time setting up, running sports, crafts, painting faces, making jewellery, looking after bouncy castles, cooking sausages, entertaining, signing children in, chatting to parents and families and bringing smiles, laughter, and hope back into a scared community. We had different entertainers each day, including people who donated their time for free from all over the country! We had very positive feedback from parents, children and the community, and got numerous thank you letters, and some good media coverage, including Newspaper articles, and TV Cameras visited us too!

# Casting earthquake blues away...

IT'S not being used for classes, but Central New Brighton School has been a hive of activity for young people across the eastern suburbs this week.

The school has been the base for a children's programme run by the Youth Alive Trust for two hours everyday, giving parents and kids a break and helping with life after the earthquake.

Youth Alive Trust team leader James Ridpath said around 600 children attended the event last week.

"Last Thursday we had 180 kids and families and every other day it's averaging around 100."

Even though the programme runs

outside, Monday's wet weather had not stopped over 70 children turning up to enjoy activities like face painting, football coaching and a magic show.

Around 20-30 volunteers are running the programme with donated supplies including marquees, bouncy castles and a free BBQ for the children.

Mr Ridpath said the programme was trying to provide as many options as possible for the children from circus skills to jewellery making.

"We've got different stations and the kids can just go from one to the other depending on what they "People from the library are going to come down and do some story times. Sports Canterbury and Mainland Football are down doing coaching. Last week they did touch rugby and we had a dance workshop and a couple of magicians.

"After that the families can go over the road to the church and get a meal, because the [Grace Vineyard] church is doing hot meals."

Mr Ridpath said the programme would run as long as it was needed.

"We'll definitely be running for the rest of the week and after that we don't know, it depends on when the schools open up."

#### **Schools Fun Afternoons**

Due to the success of the Post EQ Childrens Programmes, we had local schools ask if we could do something similar for them, as they were beginning to reopen. Children were scarred about going back onto school premises, as this was where most of them where during the Feb EQ. We wanted to promote school to be a fun place, a safe place and a happy place, so ran similar programmes and activities – including all our partners too and entertainers. The whole school would close for the afternoon and parents were also invited to join in, and the incentive of the free BBQ also helped! We then went on tour and did 5 Fun afternoons at local schools:

- 1) Central New Brighton Primary
- 2) South New Brighton Primary
- 3) North New Brighton Primary
- 4) New Brighton Catholic
- 5) Freeville Primary

This catered for approximately another 1500 pupils, plus teachers and families who were also invited. They were so successful the schools have asked if we'd consider running such event at the beginning of each year – if we could find funding. #### **Silt Shifting & Care Centre**

In the emergency situation after the EQ, our regular young people and volunteers got involved in helping shift silt from people's homes and helped with the food distribution centre that was operating in New Brighton. Many of them were involved on a daily basis, and it was through this activity, that they were able to helped their own mental health. Sometime we would take a van of young people to help in a particular area, and this included after the most recent aftershocks on 13<sup>th</sup> June, when schools were closed for a few days.

They were given no pay or particular reward for their work, but it really made us youth leaders proud of their selflessness as they were helping strangers. It's this positive publicity that young people often miss out on, but being in a group environment was all the motivation many of them needed.







Many agencies wanted do something positive for the people affected by the EQ, including celebrity football stars! A contact of Wynton Rufer had been helping us on our post EQ childens programmes, and approached us about doing a special holiday programme for children, using our community contacts and organisation, as they're based in Auckland. We were able to publicise it through all the local schools, our networks and even take our whole normal holiday programme for a football fest. Over a 2 day period Wynton and his coaches used Thomson Park for coaching 400 children aged 5 – 12 years old. They gave away free footballs, and free food, and lots of autographs. Current All White Aaron Clapham also made a guest appearance! Thanks to our volunteers who helped make this happen, and hopefully we'll be able to use this contact for future events too!

# Rufer to coach eastside kids

Football legend Wynton Rufer and his top coaches from his Auckland Academy WYNRS will run a Free Football Fest for children in the city's eastern suburbs hardest hit by the February 22 quake.

The coaching clinics will be held at Thomson Park, Marine Parade, North Beach next Tuesday (five to eight-year-olds) and next Wednesday (nine to 12-year-olds).

Two hundred free soccer balls signed by Rufer, Oceania Player of the Century, will be handed out along with free sausages, free apples and free pump water donated by Auckland companies for the eastside youngsters. Christchurch friend and

spokesman Gideon Hoekendijk said most of Rufer's expenses had been covered by sponsors including Air New Zealand and Rufer's WYNRS academy.

Christchurch player and cur-rent All White Aaron Clapham will also be present on Wednesday.
"This promises to be such an

encouragement to the kids in east Christchurch," Mr Hoekendijk said.



#### **Regular Programmes**

We know the importance of keeping children in routine and that's why we got our regular clubs up and running as soon as the building got the green sticker and our volunteers were ready. The purposes of the clubs is to provide a safe, fun, challenging and inspiring place for children and young people to go. Taking children and young people off the streets makes them a safer place, and more importantly is safer for the children and young people! Volunteers are going through their own EQ related issues, so we are short in certain clubs, and volunteers are feeling more frail than normal.

The Clubs have started even more successfully than normal, as registrations are higher and there is a closer knit feel to the groups. We're looking forward to taking the groups away on camps to bond further and take them away from the constant aftershocks. Youth leaders continue to do

Our youth leaders and volunteers helped with security, hiring the equipment, surveys and interacting with the young people. Approx 500 people turned out on the day as the community celebrated a return to normality post EQ.

Over 1000 people turned up to Thomson Park last Saturday for a community event which shouts out "I Heart New Brighton". Local community groups used earthquake response funding from NZCT to bring out the locals, raise community spirit, and celebrate what it is to live in New Brighton. Entertained by local bands NiuSeiLAH and the reformed Smoking Jacket, families took part in Tiddlers races, face painting, circus tricks, bouncy castles, skating, and enjoyed the park facilities while eating free sausages, candy floss and chocolate! "We couldn't have asked for a better day" said James Ridpath, Team Leader of Youth Alive Trust, one of the organisers. "It was cancelled last weekend due to the bad weather, and to have a scorcher of a day just brought the people out in droves! This was a chance to raise community spirits and tell the world we're proud to live and work in New Brighton and we're going to come through these difficult times even stronger".



Marcus Puentener, from New Brighton Project was stoked by how everything worked out, "It started when Belfast Community Trust wanted to do something for the eastside of Christchurch, and after a few emails and a couple of meetings with our key local partners, we managed to pull off a day to remember. We can't take credit for the weather, but if funding permits, we hope to run a 'I heart New Brighton' event next year too". ## More Canterbury students take quake-break

**AROUND** 250 Canterbury students have descended on Auckland this week for the second round of 'Break from the Quake' camps.

Not-for-profit organization Youthtown had originally arranged for more than 500 children aged 10-18 to escape the city over the July school holidays for camps in the North Island.

However, inclement weather in both Christchurch and Auckland caused the cancellation of flights and postponement of the second week of camps until October.

Youthtown chief executive, Keith Thorpe

said a great deal of work and research had gone into setting up the camps.

"We are delighted to deliver the second week of camps for the children and youth of Christchurch who have experienced a tough year at the hands of Mother Nature and deserve a break."

The young Cantabrians are split between three locations in Auckland, Hunua and Huntly.

On Monday, Auckland campers were given a tour of the newly installed Maori Waka at the Viaduct followed by a live, personalised performance from the Topp Twins at The Cloud and entry to the giant rugby ball on Queen's Wharf.

Campers in Hunua and Huntley have been taking part in a variety of activities such as a high ropes course, a disco and a Frisbee golf day.

All three groups will take a trip to Rainbow's End in Auckland.

The camps are free of charge, with all costs, including airfares, travel, food, accommodation and activities covered by Youthtown and other sponsors and supporters.

#### **New Brighton Library Holiday Activities**

Our youthworkers started working at New Brighton just on weekends over 5 years ago for extra support. We were then asked to work everyday after school too, and the security guard was ditched! After the February earthquake, there were a lack of public buildings young people could take part in recreational activities, especially local swimming pools, including QE2. The Council approached us and asked if we had the time and resources to run activities in the school holidays. We didn't have the resources to run a formal childcare programme, but we were able to run daily activities that anyone could join in. This happened for both weeks in the July and October Holidays, and 3 days per week throughout the summer holidays.

The Library is keen to see these activities continue, as they have given feedback that it engages young people in social and sport activities, when they're often only interested in playing on the computers. They also agreed that there were less conflicts among the young people when the activities were an option and it was encouraging more people of all ages to visit the library.

#### **Central New Brighton Extra School Support**



Particularly since the February Earthquakes and our activities on their school fields, we became more and more involved in the schools activities. We worked in partnership with the church to provide free Emergency Care Packs for all the families in the school. Money was used from other donors, and we were just helping to distribute and organise. We took on another sports team, which included weekly coaching, and a competition at Hagley Park. We fundraised on their behalf for new sports clothing and equipment – donated from an Australian football trust wanting to support the post EQ activities. We also received \$2,500 from the NZ Football

Foundation for goalposts, which the school has never had. We finished the year with a game against the local Police (final score 5 – 5) and the senior team qualified for the first time for a Canterbury Tournament. We were active in matching the Salvation Army support worker to the school and also working with them for a couple of events. We organised a Dodge Ball tournament, took a Gladiator Inflatable into the school at lunch and were active in supporting the senior students on a 1 on 1 basis when needed, including school camp. We also organised a day trip for the whole school and found funding from Variety to take them to Willowbank Wildlife Park and to see a special Preview Screening of Smurfs. At the end of year presentation, they awarded Youth Alive Trust with a Community Cup – the first year it's been awarded.

#### **Free North Island Family Holidays**



We were asked to help find upto 40 people from local families who were in desperate need of a family break. The organisers were providing the holiday to the North Island completely free of charge but wanted our help to find the right people. We publicised the opportunity locally, filtered appropriate candiadates and submitted them to the organisers. They are taking the families in January 2012!

**Free Family Holidays!!!** We have been given the opportunity to nominate 6 local families for holidays in the North Island in the summer break! 6 families will experience a summer beach holiday at Camp Anderson in Masterton from  $23^{rd} - 30^{th}$  January. An opportunity for upto 10 family members to take part in activities like surfing, quad bikes, paintball, fishing or just relaxing by the beach. Flights, food and activities are all paid for, and would suit families with children between ages 6 – 14. #### **Epic Dance Party**

Some of the young people we have contact with through our clubs, schools work and library work had mentioned to us that their school halls were damaged and they were missing out on school discos this year. We had the idea to organise a big Dance Party for all the Year 7 & 8's from the local schools and bring them all together. We invited 7 different schools and it worked in partnership with Blue Light at a neutral venue. It went down so well we had calls for EPIC Dance Parties every week. It will become at least an annual event.
